All notes will be handwritten must be in a stenographer's notebook.

1. Read *HRELLP* first. Complete the assignment in the "Test Case" near the end of the book. Use this information/assignment for analysis of your novels.
2. As you read through your chosen novels, record important/interesting quotations (with citations) on the left side of the steno book and your analysis on the right side. Analysis must contain at least three sentences or two complex sentences showing significance of the quotation. Try to make connections to the ideas learned in *HTRLLP*.
Note: One of the novels that you choose will also be the subject of your research project, an analysis of the author's worldview presented in the novel, due at the end of the first semester. The titles with an asterisk (*) will not be used for the research project. (If you would like to get a head start on the project, you may read a biography/auto biography of the author.)

3. After each chapter of *CC*, respond to the discussion questions. (These responses may be typed or handwritten.)
